"Karma is a Relaxing Thought" Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs

We, most of us, are pretty heavily burdened by negative karma. We are held back by the thrust of all our deluding desires, petty hatreds, and downright foolishness. Nonetheless, our darkness is dissolved by the brilliant light of Amida's



Vow Power [Hon Gan Riki]. To the Buddha we are no problem. To us, our negative deeds, our unwholesome karma is burdensome. To the Buddha, 'they ain't heavy, they're my children'.

That way of putting it may strike some of you as being too simple, too florid. But we do need ways of putting it. Shinran was struck by an analogy he found in the texts of Tan Luan. Imagine your negative karma being a huge boulder. Then imagine Amida Buddha's Compassion as a huge ship, vast almost beyond imagining. Such a vessel could carry even a massive boulder on over to the other side.

This is the basic idea, Amida adds their sizeable meritorious karma to our little bundles of some good, some neutral-ish, some very bad karma. Another analogy Shinran enjoyed, and often used, is that Amida Buddha's Vow is a vast

and pure ocean into which our tiny, tangled, muddy little streams flow. The result is a boundless body of pure water.

A certain recent song, quoted above, can be adapted to express the feeling of someone who relies upon, and rides upon, Amida's Vow power; ... how it feels to know that your lifetime (to date) of mostly bad karma has been dissolved in the purity of the Buddha's karma: "Sweet like honey, karma is a cat, purring in my lap 'cause it loves me. ... Me and karma vibe like that."

Many of you know, although I would not have a week ago, that this is from the song "Karma" by Taylor Swift. Pretty much every other pop reference to karma in the last 65 years has been negative. These particular lyrics quoted here express just what we should feel if we say the Nembutsu and rely upon the Buddha's kindly help; ... "karma takes all my friends to the summit."

These lyrics, and my remarks here may seem slight, the matters they address are not insubstantial. To the persons who open their hearts and minds to the Buddha's direct address to them in the Nembutsu, "Karma is a relaxing thought." Their/Our karma has joined the Buddha's vast pure karmic goodness. What is left is one, boundless body of pure karma. So, for each follower of the Nembutsu path, "Karma is my bestie".

The name *Ichi-Mi* derives from the Jodo Shinshu expression that we are all alike, of one taste or one flavor.
